Herman Wekker Prize 2005: Report of the Jury

The Professor Herman Wekker Prize is awarded during each biennial Nationaal Congres

Engels to a journalist from the Netherlands who has given outstanding service to the spread of

information about English-speaking countries and cultures among the Dutch public.

The prize is named in honour of the late Herman Wekker, former Professor of English

Language at the University of Groningen and one of the founders of this national conference.

He had an international vision and recognised the central importance of responsible and

exciting journalism in sharing insight and understanding between cultures. Before his early

death in 1997 he was very active among English language scholars, teachers and writers in the

Netherlands, and conceived the idea of this award.

But to whom will the prize be given in 2005?

The jury who faced the task of answering this question on your behalf consisted of five

members with different perspectives on the teaching of English in the Netherlands. Gilberto

Tevreden is a newly qualified teacher working in Zaandam; Aaltje Hollander teaches English

at a secondary school in Haren; Frans Janssen galvanises pupils of English in the VMBO

sector in Helmond; Frank Weemaes teaches VWO English and co-ordinates Twee-Talig

Onderwijs in a school in Weesp; and the chair of the jury, Helen Wilcox, is Professor of

English Literature at the University of Groningen.

This jury had lively debates about the award of the 2005 Wekker Prize, largely for the

positive reason that there was a strong field of excellent candidates working in a variety of

different media, including daily papers, weekly journals and magazines, television, radio and

the internet. While many of these journalists have kept our attention over the past two years on matters which were preoccupying America – such as the war in Iraq and the U.S. presidential elections – the jury was particularly impressed by the work of one journalist who managed to keep readers informed about, even engrossed by, what was going on a bit nearer home, just across the North Sea in Britain

This journalist has covered a huge range of topics in his reports from London: political wrangles in Westminster, school uniforms, the right to ramble across the British countryside, the novels of A.S. Byatt, to name just a few. He writes with clarity and elegance, as well as from a position of knowledge, insight and often an ironic affection for things British. Recently he has kept readers fascinated by his series of columns exploring "Engels voor Beginners", in which he has explained why "eating your tea" can make sense in English, decoded the mysteries of Cockney rhyming slang, and let us into other significant secrets of British culture such as table manners and the art of understatement. These short articles have entertained and enlightened readers and will prove indispensable in the future to teachers, learners, tourists, cultural observers and Anglophiles alike!

It is, therefore, with great pleasure that we propose to award the Herman Wekker Prize for 2005 to the NRC Handelsblad's London correspondent, **Hans Steketee**.
